Cutting the ribbon to open the new access road leading to Bhaktivedanta Manor temple, Rishi beamed: "I walked 13 miles for the temple in 1989, and now I have flown 4,000 miles to be present for these victory celebrations."

The film legend and his brother, Rajiv, had turned up to take part in the religious festival of Janamashtmi at the temple in Letchmore Heath, Herts.

Tens of thousands of worshippers gathered at the religious site to take part in the festivities celebrating Lord Krishna's birthday.
